

## PURPOSE AND INTRODUCTION

New Re-Opening Guidance, intended to keep Kansans as safe as possible while reopening our communities has been implemented to take the place of the previous Executive Orders. The intent of this guidance for Clay County is to follow the recommended guidance of the Kansas Division of Health and Environment and the Kansas Governor's Office "Ad Astra: A Plan to Reopen Kansas" as we move to full re-opening of our county.

**The full re-opening plan** outlined by Governor Kelly is called "Ad Astra: A Plan to Reopen Kansas" and is posted at <https://covid.ks.gov/>. The Ad Astra plan includes a timeline and phased-in increases in reestablishing community functions and activities ultimately reaching "Phase Four, Phase Out" no sooner than June 22, 2020.

**There are three health metrics** being reviewed in the Ad Astra Reopening Plan to best assess the status of COVID-19 in a community.

The three health metrics being used are as follows:

- Disease spread: Measures the number of new cases by date of symptom onset in comparison to the respective state and county population
- Hospitals: Number of new hospitalizations by date of admission.
- Deaths: Number of new deaths by date of death.

**The phased-in approach** setting the outer perimeter for local units of government during each phase of the plan will move the state toward full recovery. Local units of government can be more restrictive than the Ad Astra plan. Businesses previously deemed essential under the KEFF Framework will remain listed as essential. KDHE and the Governor's Office will evaluate the state's disease spread, testing rates, death rates, hospitalizations, ability of state and local public health authorities to contain outbreaks and conduct contact tracing, and personal protective equipment availability when determining if the state should take additional action to restrict gatherings or other functions to slow the disease spread.

**The Ad Astra Re-opening plan is sectioned into phases. For each phase** there is a mass gathering limit recommendation. Mass gatherings of more than the specifically determined size should be avoided.

**Mass Gathering Definition: Mass gatherings are defined as instances in which individuals are in one location and are unable to maintain a 6-foot distance between individuals (not including individuals who reside together) with only infrequent or incidental moments of closer proximity.**

All businesses not specifically identified in each phase of the re-opening plan will be allowed to re-open unless a local unit of government issues an order prohibiting such businesses from opening.

This document has been prepared to offer guidance on a safe, stepwise reopening of Clay County following the guidelines issued by the State of Kansas. We must continue to take measures to ensure the safety of our most vulnerable and continue to ensure our healthcare resources are not overburdened. We understand that restarting economic activity is one of our county's priorities at this time along with keeping our community safe and limiting the spread of COVID-19. This is a critical time to be thoughtful and careful about reopening Clay County. We do not want to have to return to a "Stay Home" order and we believe that a safe, stepwise approach will allow Clay County to accomplish this goal.

**GUIDING PRINCIPLES AND BEST PRACTICES TO BE FOLLOWED THROUGH EACH PHASE**

- State restrictions should allow for the local actions included in each phase.
- To move from one phase to the next, all of the following criteria should be met:
  - Local indicators should show decreasing or stable transmission or an increase consistent with the state’s epidemiological rate for at least 14 days before the beginning date of the next phase;
  - State recommended levels of testing capacity should be available;
  - Sufficient Personal Protective Equipment should be available;
  - Hospitals should have the capacity to treat an increased number of COVID-19 patients requiring hospitalization;
  - The public health system should be able to promptly identify and isolate infected individuals and identify and quarantine necessary contacts.
- When able, staying home is recommended.
- Social distancing measures should continue to be followed:
  - Stay 6 feet away from others;
  - Interact only with people of the same household when possible;
  - Limit non-essential travel.
- Fabric masks should be worn in all public places by community members when 6’ of social distance between people cannot be consistently obtained
- Practice good hand hygiene by washing hands with soap and water or using hand sanitizer frequently
- Avoid touching your face, mouth, nose, or eyes.
- Symptoms of COVID-19 include (but are not limited to) fever, cough, shortness of breath, sore throat, headache, chills, aches, fatigue, loss of smell or taste, nausea/vomiting, diarrhea. Stay home if any of these symptoms are present.
- Businesses, organizations, or facilities may have stricter regulations than what are listed in this document at their discretion.
- Vulnerable/High risk individuals and senior citizens should stay home as much as possible. They should stay in contact with their health care provider. They should not congregate with others who are not members of their immediate household.
- It is recommended that facilities and businesses keep a log of visitors or customers by date to aid in contact tracing. Keep that information on file for 30 days, then destroy it if not needed for contact tracing purposes by the Clay County Health Department. Information should include date, name, and phone number. If an outbreak occurs that will be helpful to the Health Department workers doing the disease contact tracing.
